NINE MEN USE CROWBAR TO 'UNLOCK' TWO BUCKS

Brimfield, Nov. 13 – Their antlers in a death lock, two buck deer which fought all night on isolated Brimfield mountain today were released by Conservation Officer James F. Donohue who pried them apart with a crowbar after almost half an hour's work.

Freed and near exhaustion, one of the bucks turned on Donahue after its release and attempted to gore him. The officer managed to jump out of the animal's path, however, as the deer's antlers caught and tore his trouser leg.

The two bucks weighing an estimated 200 pounds each, were discovered with their antlers locked, fighting and pawing at each other in a brook near the Dunhamtown section of Brimfield by Mrs. James Harrington.

She told Donahue her dogs had barked and bayed most of the night. Attempting to determine what had bothered them today, she walked through the woods near her home and discovered the two animals.

Donahue at first planned to shoot the animals and then determined that he might be able to pry them apart. With the help of nine neighbors, after working nearly a half-hour, he managed to free the bucks.

Revolutionary War Monument In March 2007, Bernie Samek approached the Brimfield Historical Commission (BHC) to inform them that he had designed a granite monument to honor the Revolutionary War veterans from Brimfield. The BHC agreed to view the memorial stone which was propped against Bernie's barn on Old Palmer Rd. in Brimfield. BHC member Mark Conners was assigned to visit Bernie and evaluate the memorial. Mark was impressed with the rough cut engraved stone with 13 stars in a circular array and brought back photos to show the BHC. The Commission agreed that the stone would make an excellent monument for the Town Common. The BHC approached the Board of Selectmen seeking permission to place the stone on the Common. The BOS immediately approved the placement on the Common and within two weeks the stone was installed,

thanks to the BOS, the Town Highway Dept. and Bernie's son who donated the base stone for the memorial. A plaque was added to the memorial thanks to Jim Adams arranging for Morin Funeral Home to manufacture the plaque and affix it to the monument stone. The plaque read: "Dedicated to the patriots of Brimfield and all Revolutionary War veterans whose courage, sacrifice, vision, and spirit gave birth to our enduring freedoms." The memorial was dedicated at the annual Memorial Day celebration on May 27th, 2007. The monument has occupied a prominent position on the Common for over 16 years and represents an example of our community pulling together to accomplish something of significance on a timely basis. Brimfield Town Flag

Brimfield once again has a town flag. The original one that the town owned had disappeared. (A second flag currently flies in the Hall of Flags at the Massachusetts State House). Thanks to the flag's designer, Nicholas Niemiro, a new one was created. A ceremony will be held next year to officially turn the flag over to the town for public use.
